# Making Neighborhoods Whole

Our Mission: The Boston Project engages neighbors and volunteers to build and nurture strong communities, characterized by God's shalom.

# Volunteers

In 2013, we made a stronger commitment to engage and depend upon volunteers and church partners to accomplish our neighborhood mission. As a result, we hired Damaris Taylor and Kristi Ellens as our new Volunteer Engagement Team. Today, volunteers include neighbors, church partners, and friends from around the corner and across the country. We have 16 church partners, with the goal of adding 9 more in the next two years. #### Highlights from Volunteer Programs:

- Neighbor Leaders. Some of our best volunteers are neighbors who donate their time, talent, and food to build a strong community. Twenty (20) adult neighbors dedicated 570<sup>+</sup> hours in leadership roles and as decision-makers for TNT Neighbors United and Parents United, and dozens more volunteered for at least a day, improving their own community.
- Mission Trips & Service Days. This year we had over 553 teens, college students, and adults serve with us for at least a day. They bring a burst of energy to tackle important projects, whether raking leaves for seniors, playing with kids at the Elmhurst Park, or adding the finishing touches to a new community garden. All together, they generously gave 8,370 volunteer hours!



Our commitment to wholistic ministry means that we care about the physical, social, academic, economic, and spiritual needs of young people and their families. What keeps us from being overwhelmed? Our place-based approach helps us to focus primarily on the 525 families that live in our small neighborhood. All of our activities build toward having a peaceful community, yet at times our families still feel the sting of violence. In 2013, we began to operate our programs from a trauma-informed approach, and continued to participate in public safety coalitions.



#### Highlights from Youth & Family Ministries:

- Summer Park Program. Over 100 children participated in our free, summer program at Elmhurst Park, made possible by your gifts to the Miracle Goal Campaign. Children loved the ReadBoston storymobile, gymnastic lessons, Bible Club, arts & crafts, sports and our new free lunch program!
- Ball for Peace Tournament. Over 100 teenagers from different neighborhoods came to the basketball court to play ball and rally for peace. This event was youth-inspired, youth-organized, and youth-led by our TNT Youth Council.
- Youth Jobs & Training. We hired 45 young people in training or employment programs, while increasing partnerships with local businesses. One exceptional opportunity was our partnership with Crossroads Community Café, a startup social enterprise promoting good food, good company, and good news.
- Spiritual Commitments. At least a dozen young people committed to following Jesus Christ this year. In 2014, we are launching a Neighborhood Life Group for adults (i.e. Bible study/small group) and will work with local church partners to strengthen our outreach to youth.

# Community Development

Our community development work is rooted in God's heart for justice. As neighbors become leaders and work together, we are able to advocate for neighborhood improvements that impact the quality of housing, jobs, healthy food access, transportation, small business development, and public safety. Tackling these important issues will have an immediate impact on our daily lives and generations to come.

Munity Development Community Development:

• National Recognition. The Talbot-Norfolk Triangle (TNT) neighborhood was featured at the national Eco-Districts Conference as an example of an older, urban neighborhood that is becoming green, healthy, and sustainable. We also launched a program to energy retro-fit 15% of the homes in TNT.
